





Park Board

- Seven member board
- Elected at-large
- Serve on a voluntary basis, without compensation
- Establish strategic direction for the Park District
- Set Policy
- Hire the Executive Director
- Staff develops detailed park plans, board approves design



Playground Replacement

- Board Policy One playground is replaced each year
- Approximately a 20 year replacement cycle
- Meet latest safety and accessibility standards
- Current playground built in 1998

Existing Basketball

















Planned Improvements – approved by the Park Board 9/23/15

- Replace playground
- Eliminate standing water issues
- Improve grading and drainage
- Enhance path quality and connection
- Relocate unsafe basketball
- Address drainage and infield mix running onto paths from ball field diamonds



Basketball Court

- Currently 1 hoop in unsafe condition in parking lot
- Improve and make it safer
- Seven other parks in Elmhurst have successful full court basketball facilities
- Comparable court with lights until 9:00 p.m. immediately adjacent to tennis courts at East End Park
- Court available for open play like skate park, playgrounds, walking paths, fishing, tennis courts, sled hills, etc.



Detention

- Park currently holds water in numerous spots for multiple days after a normal rain event
- New basins will drain in approximately one day
- Changes will keep the water out of active areas such as paths, outfields of ball fields, and open playable green space
- Basins can have plants or turf grass
- Slopes on basins will allow for recreational use
- Possibility of shifting basins further from homes on east is being evaluated



<u>Budget</u>

- Entire project, including playground \$2.2M
- Funds for basketball court are not taking funds away from any other amenities
- No tax increase for the project



Park Ambassador

- Paid staff who monitor parks
- Enforce permits, rules and ordinances, while also providing on-site customer service
- Seven days per week, April through October
- Full-time Park Ambassador supervisor is retired Deputy Chief of Police
- Work closely with Elmhurst Police Department who enforce laws and ordinances in Elmhurst parks
